Steve Tarver served the YMCA of Greater Louisville as President and CEO for more than 23 years prior to his retirement. Steve has been involved in the YMCA since he was a six-year-old growing up in Jacksonville, Florida. Involved in the Teen Leaders Club Program, his first job was as a lifeguard, swimming and gymnastics instructor. His first full-time position was as the Physical Director of the Tallahassee YMCA while attending Florida State University. He worked in program positions in Kentucky and Tennessee, and served as a YMCA Branch Executive in Nashville. Prior to Louisville, he served as the CEO of the YMCA of the Suncoast (Clearwater, Florida). Steve served as the Director of YMCA Blue Ridge Leaders' School (2007–2016) involving over 700 teens from YMCAs across the southern states. He has worked on health and wellness at the regional and national level. Steve carried the Olympic Torch prior to the 1996 Games, and has received several awards and certifications in the field of health and wellness

In all, Steve dedicated 51 years working for the YMCA. He has been a passionate and tireless supporter around the concept of health equity and social determinants during his tenure, working with countless civic leaders, leading health initiatives, supporting community organizations, and advising wellness advocates and others to improve communities such as Louisville and to benefit the lives of their residents. He has devoted much of his time to teaching children about the importance of health and wellbeing, and value-based decisions.

Under his visionary leadership, the YMCA has experienced significant growth, expanded its outreach efforts, and made a profound impact on countless lives in our community. From health initiatives dreamed up with members like the Total Movement with Parkinson's program to a community integrated health facility that houses the Republic Bank Foundation YMCA, Tarver's impact and legacy will continue to resonate across the entire community for generations.

Elmer Lucille Allen
Brown-Forman Chemist, Retired
Ceramic and Fiber Artist

Elmer Lucille Allen, a ceramic artist and chemist, was born at a time when Louisville was still a segregated city. She graduated from Central High School in 1949, when African American women had very few opportunities available to them. She attended Louisville Municipal College, a co-ed, all Black school from 1949 to 1951, then went to Nazareth College (now Spalding University) where she was one of only a few Black students, and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1953.

Allen began working as a chemist at the Brown-Forman distillery in 1966 after years of working in labs, hospitals, and then doing medical and dental research at the University of Louisville.

Allen was recognized for her contributions to the field on September 1, 2023, by the Black Bourbon Society. The organization awarded her with the Bourbon Pioneer Award and a Distinguished Citizen Proclamation, among others.

She worked at Brown-Forman for 31 years before retiring in 1997, rising from junior to senior chemist along the way. And before she retired, she had already started on another path that would bring her accolades and success as well as healing and enjoyment—that of an artist. Elmer Lucille Allen became involved in the Louisville arts scene in the 1980s. She helped form the Kentucky Coalition of African American Arts and was a founding member of the Arts Council of Louisville.

Starting in 1981 she began to study art at the University of Louisville, receiving her master's degree in Creative Arts with a focus in ceramics and fiber in 2002. Allen's textile work incorporates shibori dyeing techniques.

In 2004, she became the first recipient of the Kentucky Arts Council Governor's Award in the Arts for Community Arts.

Throughout her career, Elmer Lucille Allen was featured in several exhibits including one in 2023 at the age of 92, and has won numerous awards for her art and her community service.

In an article by American Whiskey, Allen was asked to consider the importance of art. She said, "It's maybe some things that you make, it not only helps you to heal, but it might heal somebody else." On why she creates and the impact she hopes it has on others, Allen remarks, "... I want people to view my art and to get something, take something away from that, that I've made. You know ... that's really my goal. And when you sit down and think about art, art is really a continuation of my chemistry work."
